Deborah has been an invaluable help in many aspects to keep our group running; assisting as minutes secretary and regular communication with our volunteers, as well as a faithful member of our working bee team. A big thank you to Anita, Zara, Veena, Peter Donnelly, Bob and Mark.

Thank you also to all the schools, organisations and individuals who have donated books and educational materials to LAI. Be assured that they are valued by the children and greatly appreciated by the teachers overseas.
